- e** = endemic
- es** = endemic subspecies – found only in Galápagos, but other closely related members of the species found elsewhere
- r** = resident – equivalent to native (found in Galápagos and elsewhere, but arrived in Galápagos by natural means [plants and invertebrates])
- i** = introduced – brought to Galápagos by man, either deliberately or inadvertently
- m** = migrant – regular visitor, normally in the northern winter
